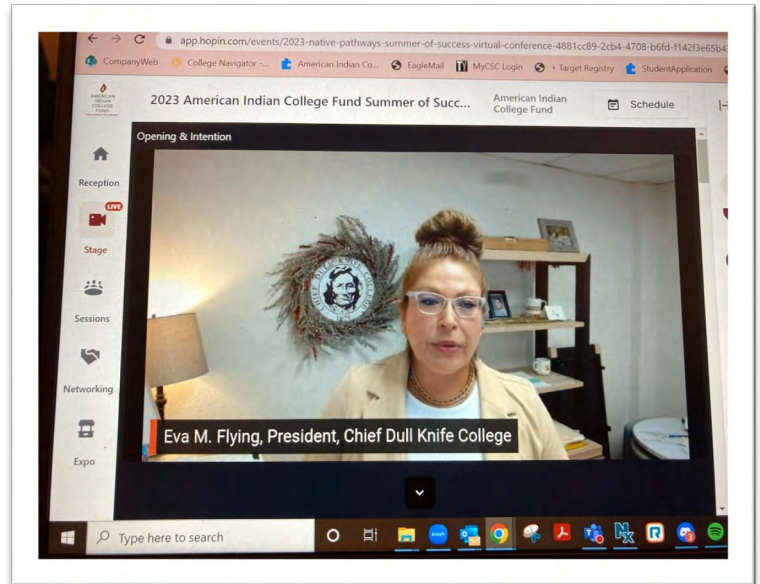
At the end of June, I was invited to attend the Work Based Learning Collaborative, held at West Creek Ranch outside of Livingston, MT. I was connected with WBL via OCHE (Office of the Commissioner of Higher Education) with the state of Montana. This program is part of the Reach Higher Montana nonprofit organization working at the intersection of education and careers. I believe this program is a great connecting point for our students and our community.



Next, in early July, I was invited to be the keynote speaker at the opening Summer of Success Virtual Conference, with the American Indian College Fund. Here I got to engage with students across the country on the great things we do as Tribal Colleges, and the opportunities available. As the President, this work of outreach and engagement is two-fold. First to support students and secondly, but just as importantly, to raise up the Tribal Colleges, especially Chief Dull Knife College.

Finally, at the beginning of August I was invited by the diversity, equity and inclusion committee, Department of Rehab, to speak with Duke University and Duke Health, as part of their speaker series in Grand Rounds. There were roughly 200 attendees with backgrounds in physical therapists/ assistants/ students, occupational therapists/ assistants/ students, therapy aides, patient revenue management organization team members and other administrative team members. Again, this was my opportunity to introduce and educate those listening on Tribal Colleges, rural reservation health systems and access. From this discussion, we entered into ways to partner and promote degree's in the physical therapy and occupational therapy fields to our students at CDKC.

STEM SUMMER INTERNSHIP 2023

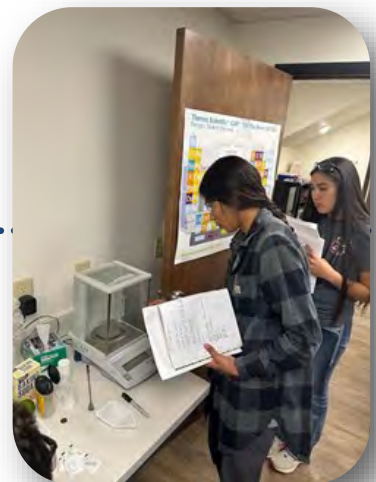
Water Research at Tongue River Reservoir

Interns spent eight weeks at Tongue River Reservoir collecting water samples and data. The information gathered will be used in continued partnership with Fish Wildlife and Parks in our water research program. Interns used a water column sampler to collect water samples from different depths and coordinates. Interns also used the Hanna Meter to gather information on Ph, %DO, FNU, and multiple other indicators. They then input the information into a database.



Water Analysis Lab

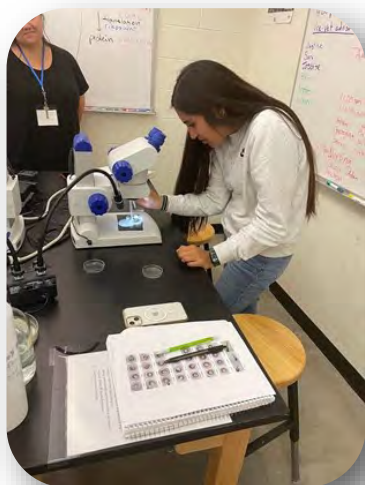
Interns worked in the Water Analysis lab and were able to get a better understanding of the equipment that they have access to here at the college. Interns ran different water sample tests using various buffer solutions. The Lachet and Metrohm instruments were used to measure nitrates and nitrates in the water samples collected from Tongue River Reservoir.



RockOn! Wallops Island

Elmore Limberhand and Jozette Limpy attended RockOn! RockOn! It is a hands-on workshop teaching participants how to create a sounding rocket experiment from scratch over five days and then launch it into space on the 6th day of the workshop.

This is a team experience and takes place at Wallops Island, Virginia. The interns constructed a payload that was inserted in a rocket's capsule and sent into space. After retrieving the canister, the students will examine the data from the payload.



Zebrafish Research course at MSU Bozeman

Interns collected zebrafish embryos. They introduced toxins from the environment that could cause birth defects- alcohol, caffeine, marijuana, and fentanyl! were a few of the substances they introduced to the embryos. This allows our interns to work in a lab on a bigger campus.



Alumni Spotlight: Ambrien Risingsun

After graduating from CDKC with my AS in 2020, I enrolled at the University of Montana where I am currently studying Integrative Physiology with a focus on Pre-Physical-Therapy. What really helped me be successful at CDKC was all the teacher to student contact and being able to have that one on one interaction. 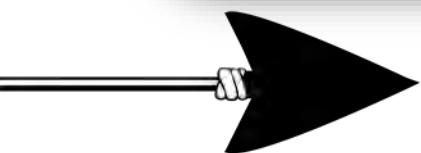


ROSEBUD BATTLEFIELD

Students are an elite group of SDB Choose Development! Fellows who will spend two summers pursuing independent research in the mentor's laboratory.

The Society will ensure dissemination of research accomplishments through the Fellows' participation in SDB regional and/or national meetings, complemented by strong support and encouragement from members of this scientific community.

I firmly believe it's our responsibility to honor our elders and community by pursuing knowledge that can be used to better our homelands. my journey was not walked alone as I had incredible mentors such as Angie Hedges and the CDKC team to help guide me.

Alumni Spotlight: Calvin Russette

Ma'táá'óhnée'éstse naha'se (Stands in Timber is my name), I am Northern Cheyenne and come from the Northern Cheyenne Reservation in Southeastern Montana. I've graduated from Chief Dull Knife College (CDKC) and am pursuing a Mechanical Engineering major with a minor in Engineering Management at Montana State University.

I am currently working as a Lab Assistant at the Space Science and Engineering Laboratory at Montana State University – Bozeman. The Space Science and Engineering Laboratory is an interdisciplinary center of expertise with faculty, staff, and facilities for space research and space technologies. I am working under Professor Charles Kankelborg and our team is in the early stages of development of a project that will take measurements of solar flares from the Sun. Our team's project will fly as an attachment on the NASA MUSE Satellite.

There are various factors that helped me to succeed at CDKC which in turn made me a better student at Montana State University – Bozeman, these are a few of them. The faculty professors at CDKC were very encouraging, patient, and willing to take extra time to explain difficult concepts.
