CDKC Benefits from Productive Visit by Northwest Commission

Chief Dull Knife College hosted an accreditation review by the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities from April 11-13, 2011.

Regional accreditation of postsecondary institutions such as CDKC is a voluntary, non-governmental, self-regulatory process of quality assurance and institutional improvement.

The full scale evaluation of the college involved

eight evaluators from throughout the seven-state northwest region. Each of the evaluators works in a two-year institution of higher education. Collectively, they provided CDKC with valuable insights and recommendations as well as the opportunity for productive interaction with peers.

The college feels that the newly revised accreditation standards and self-study process will provide an effective guideline for



systemic planning and improvement.

The College would like to express its appreciation to the board, administration, faculty, staff, students and community members who participated in this very meaningful and positive experience.

Math Department Recognized for Being a Model of Success

With the help of Bob Madsen, the math department at CDKC submitted a proposal to the Penn Graduate School of Education for its Minority-Serving Institutions "Models of Success" grant competition.

CDKC was one of just 9 schools chosen from across the country to receive \$50,000 towards increasing the academic success rates of its students.

To earn the award, CDKC had to demonstrate that it is implementing innovative approaches to instruction that are contributing to the greater success of its students.

Math instructors showed that improvements they have made to the math curriculum over the last three years have led to an average 20% increase in the passing rates of math stu-

dents, up from about a 50% passing rate to about a 70% passing rate.

The award will be used to continue to improve the basic math and intro algebra curricula. Changes will include restructuring certain courses and incorporating more hands-on, real-world problems and projects into CDKC's math classes.

What year did you graduate?

But also, I became an employee at CDKC soon after graduation and have worked here for 5 ½ years. Going to school has helped me be more responsible and has opened up many doors in life.

What advice can you give to those now graduating from CDKC?

My advice to students now graduating is: now that you made it this far, it isn't much farther to get your bachelor's, and for me that was the fun part. Also, now that you gained some important life skills, improve on them and then teach them to others.

What advice can you give to those still in school?

Make sure there are people around you who support your educational goals, and use the people at the college (seriously, they want to help you). Most important of all, don't stop when you come to challenges in your life; just remember that we all have them and if we (the former graduates) did it then so can you!!


